IN MEMORIAM

Greeley Assembly No. 6 wishes to pay
tribute to a departed sister, Judy Mason
McKay, who was killed in an auto accident
this spring. The tragedy was a shock to the
entire community, especially those who had
known this outstanding girl.

She was very active throughout her high
school career, and all those who knew her
were impressed with her friendly personality
and leadership ability. She took part in vari-
ous school activities, and in her senior year
was selected homecoming queen. She was
a devoted Rainbow Girl, and served in the
office of recorder, as well as in several other
offices. She was selected in 1960 as the out-
standing senior girl, and she later received
the Grand Cross of Color Degree.

She was married last year to Jim McKay,
who was an outstanding athlete at Greeley
High School. At the time of the accident,
he was in spring training for professional
baseball.

The funeral was held in April, and the
beautiful Rainbow service was given at the
graveside.

Our memorial service was performed at
our June 22 meeting, and the flowers for the
memorial service at Grand Assembly were
a gift of the Greeley Assembly in memory of
Judy.

We pray that all Rainbow Girls every-
where may be inspired by this poem which
Judy herself wrote:

bloom

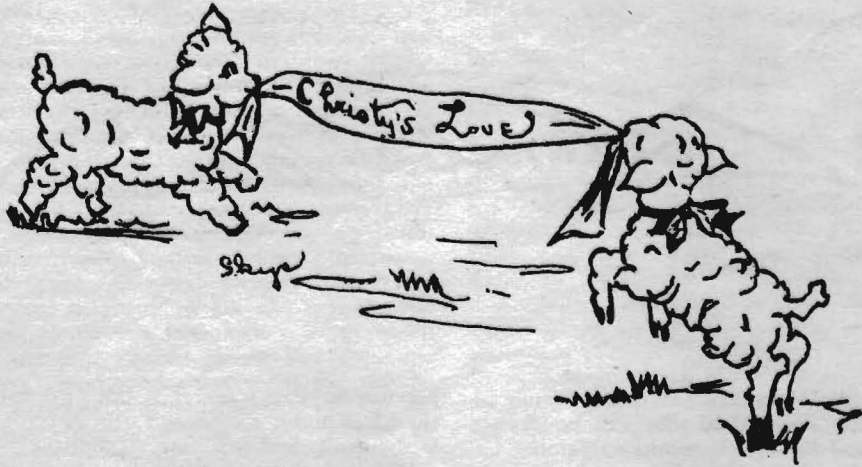
As the breeze gently blows—we scent the

You need patience. There are many, many times when you need patience. There are too many times when I am irritable. It is needless for me to tell you, but if you have Patience the hours of indurability pass.

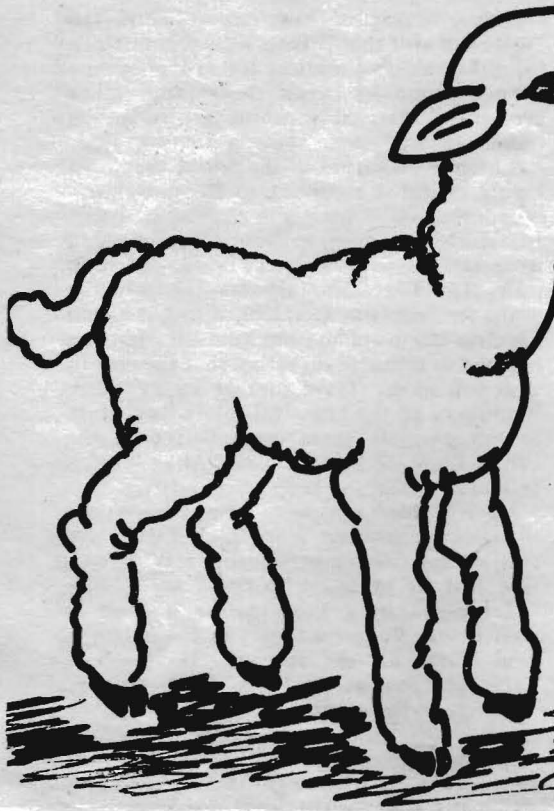

Congratulations girls, and let's all say thanks to the wonderful Rainbow Girls of Colorado who donate the monies for these scholarships.

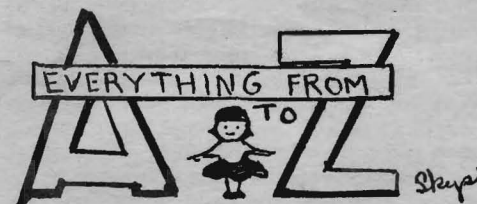
