Registration for the 35th annual Grand Assembly will be held in the Memorial Center on the Campus of the University of Colorado. Registration will begin at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, June 17. Registration fee will be \$2.00.

Mr. William Morris of Boulder is General Chairman and Mrs. Larry Littlejohn is in charge of registration and housing. Her address is 541 Iris Ave., Boulder. Mrs. Littlejohn asks that reservations be in her hands not later than May 10th.

Informal opening will take place Wednesday night, June 17 at 7:00 in the Ballroom of the Memorial Center. This is the only meeting that will be open to the public.

Girls and their chaperones will be housed and fed by the University in the dormitories for a total cost of \$18.00. This will include all meals, special luncheons, banquet and lodging from the Wednesday evening meal through Saturday noon meal, except the Grand Officers' Banquet to be held Wednesday at 5:30 p.m. An extra charge of \$1 will be made for all dignitaries attending this banquet. There will be no reception for dignitaries this year. Persons not living in the dormitories may attend the special luncheons and banquets by securing their tickets at the time of registration or before. For those not staying in dorms, special luncheon tickets will be \$1.25. Grand Banquet and Grand Officers' Banquet will be \$2.50.

Boulder Assembly will be the Hostess Assembly and will be assisted by the other Assemblies in District No. 2. They are: Fort Lupton, Temple, Longmont, Lafayette, Welcome and Brighton. They are all eagerly anticipating June, and they hope to make this the best Grand Assembly ever.

A TRIBUTE TO MOTHER

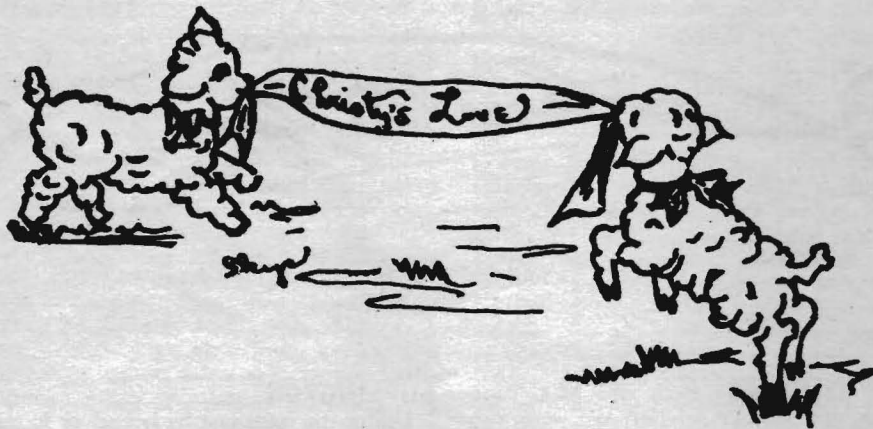

Christy, every girl in Colorado must love you as we do. Noah represents a very small part of this Love.

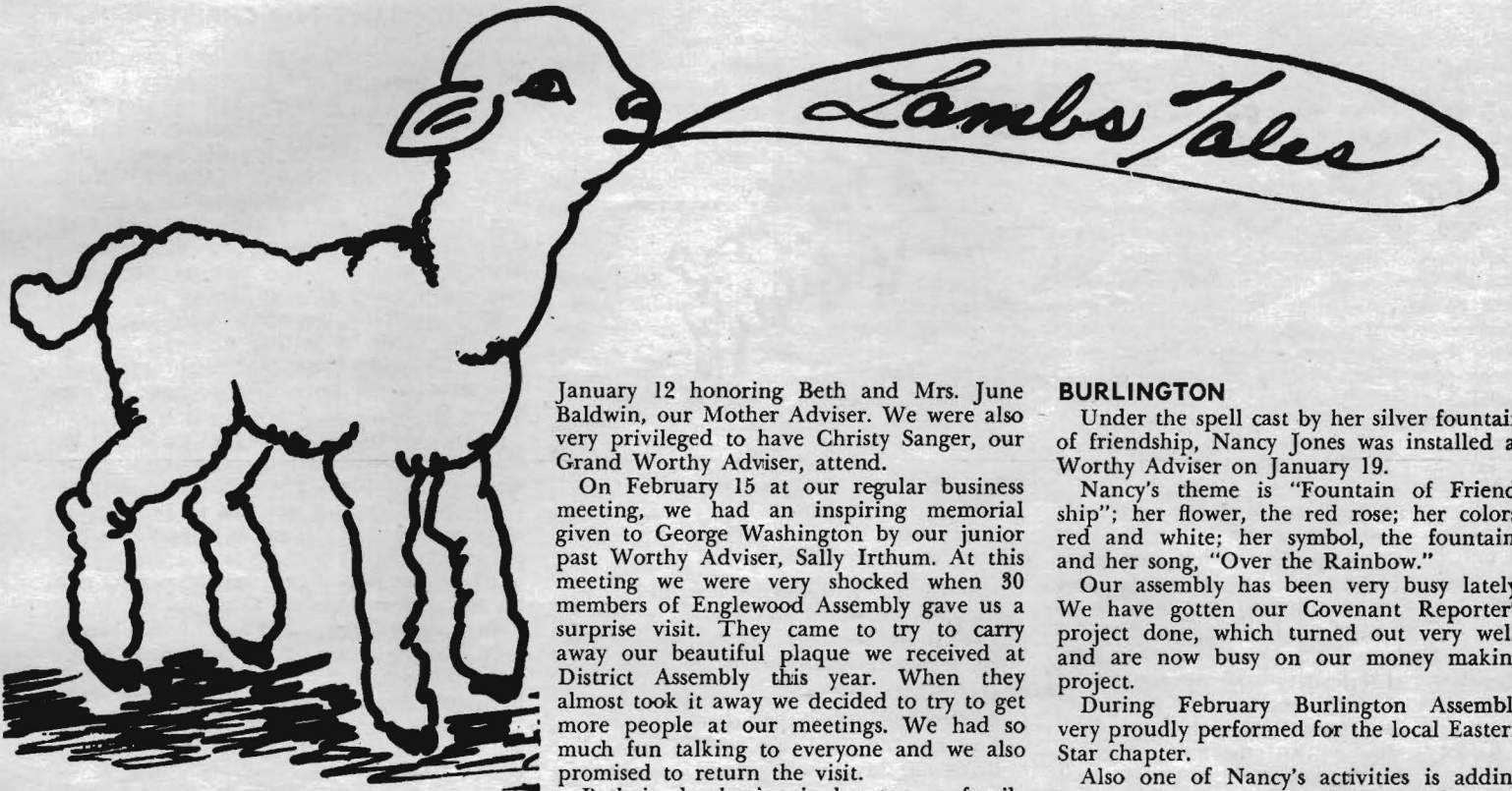

THE ART OF FREEDOM

A child is born and his first rights consist of a flag and an altar. These are his from birth, but from then on he must strive to keep them secure for himself. No one can have a flag without an altar. Our American flag is a symbol of freedom, but freedom is man's gift from God. Thomas Jefferson said, "The God who gave us life, gave us liberty at the same time."

But who is responsible for freedom? Responsible. The heart of that word is *response*. It is one person's response to another that determines the social relationship of the world in which we live. If each person did just as he pleased, we would soon have chaos and anarchy. But if each person acts with respect to the other person's rights, then we are truly free. Someone once said, "We each have a share in the responsibility for the freedom of everyone. And so long as any are not free, no man is secure in his freedom."

God told us the answer to the question "Who is my brother?" when Cain answered "No man." Jesus answered, "Every man."

The founders of our great country knew this and had the wisdom to include it in the Constitution in only a few words—"Provide for the common defense."

Our country has a heritage of freedom. In a Fourth of July address, the late President John F. Kennedy said, "The Liberty Bell rang to tell the world of the birth of a new country's freedom. When bells ring again, thing back on those who lived and died to make our country free and then resolve with courage and determination to keep it free and make it greater."

The greatest symbol of American freedom is the American flag. To a soldier the flag assumes supreme meaning when he has given his life for his country. Then, in return, his country gives him her greatest reward—her colors. All through history, the United States has fought wars to preserve her freedom and her flag. She has preserved both, and has added 37 new stars in doing so.

The meaning of American freedom was demonstrated utterly when, in World War II, General Anthony C. McAuliffe was demanded to surrender by the Germans at Bastogne on December 23, 1944. His one-word reply, which is now world-famous, was simply "Nuts!"

The American flag, since its first unfurling, has played a part in more movements for the elevation of mankind and for man's protection of his liberty than any other flag in history. Our flag is red, white, and blue. Red is for courage, zeal, and fervency. White is for purity, cleanliness of life, and rectitude of conduct. Blue is for fidelity and truth. The star is an ancient symbol of dominion and sovereignty.

Even our flag bears the symbols of freedom. What is freedom? Freedom is a per-
