Boulder Hosts Grand Assembly For First Time in 1935

Our records show that at the Grand Assembly Sessions held in Boulder in 1935 there were 575 registered Rainbow Girls and Adults. It was a three-day session and was held in the Womens Gym on Campus. Miss Emily Poe, P.W.A. acting as Mistress of Ceremonies at the Informal Opening using the theme, "Rainbow Hidden Secrets." Toasts were given by Faith, Hope, Charity and the Rainbow Hues. Audry Tate of Grand Junction was the Grand Worthy Advisor and Margaret Yates (Hascall) was the Worthy Advisor of Boulder Assembly. Margaret was later installed as Grand Musician for the ensuing year. Now you all know, this same Margaret is the Grand Deputy of District No. 2.

Hi-lights were: a swimming party; Pageant entitled, "Rainbow in Practice," which was written and presented by Alpha Chapter of Fort Collins, 60 girls participating Opening night was the banquet and Promenade at Memorial Bldg. A five piece Orchestra played, which is not unusual but neither was the music they played. Some of the numbers included; Dinah, St. Louis Blues, Star Dust, Tiger Rag, Lullaby of Broadway, Lovely to Look at, When I Grow to Old to Dream and I Wanna Dance. It seems the Charleston was the popular dance at that time and "everyone" was doing it. The closing session was the Vesper Service held in Sunrise Circle on Flagstaff followed by a beef-steak fry.

In 1951 Boulder hosted the "Session of Faith" with Mary Young (Panetta) of Boulder Assembly serving as Grand Worthy Advisor. Mrs. Utahana Stuart, Mother Advisor of Boulder Assembly was in charge of decorating the Grand East which was in keeping with the "Ship of Faith" theme. Registration reached a high of 1295 and the sessions were held in the High School Gym. On Saturday a free Barbeque was held on Flagstaff followed by a dance that night in the Gym. We find no record of the names of the music played but we do know that the dance craze then was the beginning of the Jidder Bug.

then was the beginning of the Jidder Bug. This brings us to 1964 and the "Lamb of Love Session" with our Lamb, Christy Sanger presiding as Grand Worthy Advisor. Last year the registration reached 1,465 Rainbow Girls, Masons and Eastern Stars. Let's make it at least 1500 this year. Boulder is going all out to give us a very enjoyable Grand Assembly so let's prove to them how grateful we are by our attendance.




