As has been stated many times, all lists must be in before they can be worked up and this year the final lists arrived on March 4th. Two assemblies held up the entire state for two weeks after all the other assembly lists had arrived. Since I am attending the grand visitations in my District with the Grand Worthy Advisor the first two weeks in March, it is impossible for me to start work on them before March 15th. It is my job to sort the lists according to name, state and town and Mother Advisors, had you followed your instructions this would only take me about three days. It teaches them organization and gives them an opportunity to direct the affairs of the organization that is their own and impress them with the real needs of leadership.

It is not the intention of Rainbow to burden their members with unnecessary work, neither do we wish to duplicate in our program the work that they are required to do in school, or to detract from their church activities, but we do believe that a little part of their time should be devoted to a study of the fraternal life of America. Rainbow was not created in order to multiply junior organizations, but to serve a real purpose in the future growth and development of the girlhood of America from the fraternal viewpoint. 
PRAYING HANDS

Miss Edith Moran was installed as Mother Advisor. She succeeds Mrs. T. J. Serafini who has been Mother Advisor for twenty years.


