

SUPREME ASSEMBLY

Supreme Assembly will be held in Denver, Colorado, July 24th through the 29th. This will be a wonderful experience for the girls of Colorado to meet girls from all over the fifty states and foreign countries as well. You will meet the Inspectors and Deputies that guide Rainbow throughout the world. We hope that many of you will make plans to attend Supreme Assembly. We are asking those girls that live within an area of 25 miles not to make reservations to stay over night as we will need the space for our visitors.

The General Chairman of Supreme Assembly is Mr. Fred Sanger, 3945 South Jersey Street, Denver, Colorado. The Chairman of Reservations is Mrs. Velma Monroe, 2915 South Winona Court, Denver, Colorado. We are saving Colorado Women's College at \$2.50 per night, the YMCA and the YWCA at \$1.50 per night for the Colorado girls and adults.

Your Mother Advisor has a tentative program which includes the prices of the banquets and luncheons and barbecue. Please ask her to let you see this tentative program so that you can make plans to attend Supreme Assembly.

It is a custom in Supreme Assembly for girls to exchange things with girls from other states. It is up to each Assembly to provide for the things which they wish to exchange. However, please make it something appropriate to Colorado.

We are asking that one person make all the reservations for the Assembly and send the reservations and the money to the people indicated on the Tentative Program.

We would like the girls of Colorado to be dressed alike with blue denim skirts and red and white checkered shirts or blouses. You will need a formal if you plan to attend the General Banquet.

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A PRAYER FOR PEACE

Johnny is not barefoot or hungry; he leads a good life. But Johnny too lacks something. Three weeks ago his father died in Viet Nam.

This is the real tragedy of war: what it does to the innocents—the children.

They had no part in its making; yet, they are the ones who suffer. War takes the shoes off their feet, the food out of their mouths, and their loved ones from them. War teaches them to hate. Put Johnny and Stasha together in a yard and they would play happily. But tell Johnny that Stasha is Russian and tell her that he is American and they would fight. Johnny knows that Russians are bad, and Stasha knows that Americans are bad.

It is for these children that we must have peace. They must have the chance to live and grow in a world that knows not the hatred and bitterness of war. For Johnny and Stasha it is too late. Their lives are already drawn into the complex web from which there is no escape. The hope must be for their children.

Lord, men are willing to fight and to die for peace. They are children stumbling in the dark. Man seeks peace, but he does not know how to find it. Please, Lord, take his hand and show the way.
